President's Message

"How is your term as President going?" is a question I am frequently asked. Many times it is accompanied by a hand gently placed on my forearm, a concerned expression such as you would expect at a relative's funeral, and a look that says, "Thank God it's you and not me". I usually answer, "It's easier than I thought. Thank you for asking."

It's true. It is going better than I thought. But I've come to realize that my post has an image problem — as a daunting, time-consuming, take-over-your-life commitment. True, if I had wanted, I could have thrown myself into the role until I became involved in every aspect of church life, but I consciously choose not to. I chose instead to take care of basic business; the Executive meeting, the Board meeting, the pledge campaign and other congregational meetings and committees that are part of my mandate. While this may sound dry and uninspiring, these meetings bring members of this congregation together to work as a team. We are truly blessed with a wonderful group that works well together with such generosity and inspiration.

At this point you are probably wondering: "OK, where is he going with this?"

My reply is: Don't be afraid to volunteer for a position on the Board or even on the Executive. We presently have two Board portfolio positions to fill: Worship Committee Chair and Building Chair.

The Worship Committee is working well, with our minister Diane and a team of five planning Sunday services. A Worship Committee chairperson is needed to organize the meetings, a task currently handled by Diane.

The Building Chair vacancy is urgent. Bob Edgar, who has taken on the duties of Treasurer this year, finds himself doing double duty as acting Building Chair, the role he held last year and which is no longer officially his responsibility.

I believe it is our congregational obligation not to exploit such generosity. I would like to see someone step up and assume the role of Building Chair for the balance of this term. If you do not want to go it alone, team up with someone and work on it together. I will even exempt you from attending Board meetings if that is what is holding you back (Presidential privilege!).

Taking on a role of responsibility in our congregation need not be something to fear. I encourage members of this community who have not yet considered taking on a role of responsibility to consider giving of your time and talents as outlined above. It does not have to take over your life; you can set your limits. You might find it unexpectedly rewarding!

DRE Report: Peacemaking Continues...

The Religious Education (RE) Committee has decided to continue the theme of "Being Peacemakers" for all this RE year, so please continue to bring items for our display area in the lower foyer. The Primers class contributed a homemade book about Gandhi, whom they studied in November as a "man of peace". The Garden class made "white Poppies for Peace" during their lesson on Remembrance Sunday, also on display. As many of you may know, I am a lifelong member of the Society of Friends, or Quakers, so I have been "programmed" towards peacemaking! Recently I found an excellent article in a Friends' publication "21 Tips on Personal Peacemaking". The whole article is posted on the wall leading downstairs, or can be found at <http://www.friendsjournal.org/personal-peacemaking>

I tried to summarize this inspiring list in child-accessible ways, which I have also posted — but to give you a bit of a teaser, here are some key "tips":

- My story and your story about whatever happened are both "true", so it doesn't help to try and decide whose version is right, or even who is in the wrong.
- "I'm right!" or "It's YOUR fault" are variations on blame, and blaming is not helpful to anyone involved. We listen respectfully to one another and try to build bridges across our

differences (some of which may be unconscious factors of our different cultures).

Although the author stresses that no one actually "makes" us feel a certain way — we choose what we feel, it's a hard concept for me to accept. Perhaps you, like me, accepted messages from our childhood selves such as "If she is angry at me, then I must be bad", or "If he's disappointed in me, then I'm unworthy." Not so! Each of us is trying our best, and none of us is without goodness. Imagine the peacemaking that could go on globally if everyone internalized these tips! Let's cheer on our RE classes — teachers and students alike — as they learn more.

The RE Quilt

Seeing the memory-filled quilt covering our "Peace Making shelves", Maychai Brown wrote:

That quilt was done in 1986 when I was the DRE... We were inspired by a curriculum developed by the late Myrna Wood and others at the Lakeshore Congregation called "The Canadian Tapestry". Based on the first UU principle, we studied ethnic Canadian immigrants, their journeys to this continent, their cultures and religions. Using the Lakeshore format, we developed our own units on Mohawks (Iroquois), French settlers, and Jewish, African and Japanese immigrants. At that time we had two groups of children — "Juniors" and "Seniors", both of which studied the different ethnic cultures for several weeks.

At the end of each unit, we met together and shared what we'd learned. The curriculum was heavily crafts based. While the children worked on crafts, the teachers talked about the history and traditions of the groups. We had fun making Mohawk baby carriers for cabbage patch dolls, Mohawk pottery, Jewish Mezuzahs to

put in your doorways, comics-style booklets telling Moses' story, a huge mural depicting the lives of the early French settlers, African masks, and a model of a Japanese tea room, done by Kathy and Jim Douglas (still active!). At the end of each unit, the children were invited to make designs using fabric crayons on patches of materials. I

In May, we chose which squares to put in the tapestry. Another parent — Christine, a physician — and I sewed them together using a different coloured background for each group. Et voila!

Being Peacemakers depends on us all learning one another's story, and this historic quilt had a role in that process. Thanks, Maychai!

Mitten Tree News!



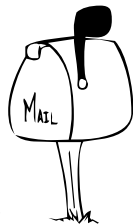
