Message from our Sabbatical Minister Rev. Carole Martignacco

"Covenantal relationships reflect unity and grace and poise. They are an expression of the sacred nature of relationships."

Happy Kallends of January — blessings on your beginnings! As we begin our "sabbatical" adventure, I'm thinking about the nature of this "dance we do" — about patterns of relating we might create.

Ours is a threshold moment, a brief window of time. The Steering Committee and I have signed a contract for my brief term, spelling out agreements. Yet the deeper dimension of our work, as stated above, calls for something more. Whether it ever gets to the written stage, a covenantal relationship exists in the background of our shared ministry.

Decades ago, as a teacher in the 1980s, I learned the importance of contracts for encouraging students' ownership of their learning. "What grade do you want?," I'd ask; together we'd agree on terms and define tasks to accomplish. Switching to UU religious education demanded both ministry and teaching. Instead of grades, closing words — sung in a circle, holding hands. Classroom covenants helped internalize the Seven Principles. What do we need from our mates, what are we willing to promise, how shall we be together?

Newcomers were invited in: "we agree, we agree — how about you?" Always the same basic needs, whatever the age: safety, respect, no biting, shoving or jeering, plus handshakes and saying sorry. Covenants were artistically decorated and posted on the wall, renewed as each class convened, and returned to as often as needed.

In *Enabling Covenantal Relationships*, Bret Simmons explains: "Contracts are the currency of bosses and subordinates; covenants the currency of partners. Interdependent partners in covenant relationship commit to enabling each other to keep promises established to achieve the vision, values, goals and daily behaviours consonant with their shared purpose." Church — while offering myriad learning opportunities — is not school. Despite the necessary business we conduct, we differ from corporations, not least in how we count our "prophets." Instead of top down, volunteer working relationships are lateral; power is shared. Compensation in reli-

gious community tends toward intangibles: meaningful connections, making a difference, a life of larger purpose. In committee, social action, fundraising or conducting worship, who and how we are together is more significant than any task.

Covenants are suited to religious community because, unlike secular institutions, we offer gifts of the spirit: love, hope, forgiveness, renewal. Again, Bret Simmons: "Covenant relationships are forged with purposeful promises. All parties ... are motivated to keep their promises ... because they share passion for a When promises are strained, covenant encourages restoration instead of recourse." Together we create what we need to live in right relationship, for the well being of the whole.

We have such a brief time together. Before we know it (to mix metaphors), our dance will be over, we'll be tying up loose ends, and the symbolic baton we passed on December 4 will pass back to my colleague and your settled minister, Rev. Diane Rollert. But 'ere this window closes, perhaps you'd like to dance with me about how a covenant fits the nature of who you are and wish to be as a religious community.

Notes from DRE Caroline Balderston Parry

Celebrating the Dark: Behind the Scenes of a Multigenerational Service

About 180 people attended our very successful annual Multigenerational service on December 18, including over 30 children and youth. Maychai Brown praised it as “one of the best in 30 years, partly because of its clear focus.” I hope you will enjoy a few stories from behind the scenes and this will also permit me a few extra “thank yous.”

Diane Rollert suggested I plan the service with ministerial student, Nicoline Guerrier, as R.E. is an aspect of her studies which she is currently trying to expand. Diane anticipated how busy she herself would be in December, preparing for her sabbatical, so we were pleased to let her sit back and be a congregant.

Diane shared the concept of the “dark of winter” altar with the four items we were grateful for — apples, evergreens, stones and animals — items the children could bring forward. In October, I pored over legends about the sun and its powers and began listing more ideas for the service to give Sandra Hunt, our Music Director, enough lead time to choose appropriate songs for the choir. Eliza Moore, our fiddler extraordinaire, enthusiastically agreed to help, and Nicoline and I decided on the title “Celebrate the Dark!” We wanted to create ways to include those children coming for the first time, and the processional movements you saw reflected that. Planning took a lot of energy but was invigorating.

By late November, Shawn Dohring had the children’s choir practicing with the new hand chimes; we had materials to build our altar (thanks to Susan Gyetvay for yards of dark blue velvet), and R.E. assistant, Victoria, with volunteer Carolyn Lancaster, had ransacked R.E. supplies for small stuffed animals and cloth to make banners.

A week before the Multigen, the children met in the dimly lit Chapel to share joys and concerns, hear a story about the star hidden in the centre of every apple (if you cut it crosswise), learn about the overall plan for the Multigen, and contribute words to the partly written pageant. That’s how “Movember” and “Decembeard” came to be included in the text, as well as their honest feelings, incorporated as:

“September was the season for back to school... it was fun, boring, tiring; we were nervy, shy, glad to talk to our friends.”

When the weather continued warm and variable, we altered the December text to read: “Everywhere we see bare tree branches and evergreen pine trees... Snow has come, turned to slush and ice, melted. It’s time for more snow to follow, for snow balls and snow people... “ We changed the words of speakers Trevor and Alex (from the youth group), to have them ask, and the children echo: “Snow fell, melted; will it fall again?”

Nicoline, who brought abundant pine boughs and blue packing quilts for the altar, supplied apples, helped creatively construct our altar from a coat rack and patiently dealt with the minutiae of the order of service (extra kudos to administrator Verna Litwack for that faithful work). And Nicoline composed the beautiful meditation for that Sunday. It ended with these words,

“You, too, are one of the animals of the earth, though perhaps, as a two-legged being, you feel yourself to be different at times. Like all animals, you need food, and a house of some sort, clean water to drink, and a world that is big enough to allow you to do that special thing that you do best. Of course you need love, and relationships. And you also need sleep, at least once every 24 hours. Like animals snuggling into their dens, you, too, need to curl inside yourselves and retreat from the world at least once a day. So take some more deep breaths. Feel how inside yourselves there is a wonderful place of restful dark, a place that no one can take from you. Enjoy this place; come to know it better.”

I truly hope you have rested well over the holidays, and found some moments of silent communion with yourself and your loved ones that echo the lovely deep quiet that those present shared during the meditation at our Multigen.

Message from Sandra Hunt

Until recently, my job at the UCM has consisted of two separate positions: Sunday Service Musician and Choir Director. I began in 1987 (the fall after the church on Sherbrooke Street burnt down) on an annual contract basis as Church Musician. In 1997, I was promoted to Music Director, which lasted until 2004. At that point, the congregation was compelled to scale back its expenditures and abolish the position because the church was having to dip into the principal of the endowment fund to pay the salaries of its professional staff. In December 2011, the Steering Committee voted to re-establish my title as Music Director.

The Music Ministry Collective’s (MMC) working group — comprised of Caroline Jondahl, Sebastian Piquette, Margo Ellis and led by Carol Cumming Speirs — has assiduously researched other churches, consulted with various people and developed both a vision statement (brought to its final form by Caroline), and a job description (brought to its final form by Margo). We now have a detailed outline of the Music Director’s tasks that complement the MMC proposal. To oversee its application and determine salary and benefits, a new and expanded Personnel Committee will meet in January.

Please support and celebrate with me in the coming year. To start, a concert of delightful music by Stravinsky, Poulenc and Faure for cello and piano which I and my husband, Gary Russell, will present on January 28 at 7:30 pm in the Sanctuary.

Then, on March 18, the generous and talented Sebastian Piquette is organizing a special fundraiser to mark my quarter centennial at the church! All musical groups in the congregation are invited to play and to please contact Sebastian for details.

Finally, think about joining Parts in Peace, our adult choir, and sharing in the joy of singing and making a difference at the Sunday services. Our first rehearsal for the new year will be on January 19 at 7:30 pm. At 6 pm we will all meet for a New Year Potluck.
