Music Message from Sandra Hunt

Music at the UCM this fall is full of projects and successes. Parts in Peace has stabilized with some 16 faithful choristers attending weekly rehearsals and the once-a-month potluck. We have sung three times already this fall. For November 6, in advance of Remembrance Day, we're practicing the moving *In Flander's Fields* and *Find the Cost of Freedom* by Crosby, Stills and Nash. I am creating MP3 files for each vocal part of each song the choir learns. Sue Montgomery, the UCM webmaster, puts them on our choir page. (Check it out -- there are songs posted that you can practice at home for singing with the congregation and/or for joining in at our Thursday night rehearsals!)

Parts in Peace and the children's choir are the musical groups in the church that have open membership. Their special roles foster musicianship, build community bonds and create transformative experiences that can only be accomplished as a group. I would like to see the congregation invest in avenues that build confidence and broaden the musical participation of our members. For instance, one of my goals is to hire soprano and bass "ringers" with professional training to support the Parts in Peace choir members to sing the correct pitches and rhythms with confidence. Paying our song leader, Ann Cascarano, would ensure that the congregation gets the support it needs to sing with ease.

I am planning projects for 2012 that include a multi-choir workshop, a drumming workshop and a concert series.

Finally, I'd like to thank the various groups and individuals who contribute glorious music at the church. Special thanks to Larry Dionne and his associates for creating our beautiful new UCM music logo and last, but not least, to the hard-working and intensely committed Music Ministry Collective.
