A Time to Slow Down

What an amazing end to the year. We've had our first joint meeting of our new Steering Committee and Council. As I leave for my summer break, I feel especially confident that the church is in good hands. Our new leadership is enthusiastic and ready. We're off to a good start.

Summer is a time for us to slow down. Our children and youth programs take a break. The office shifts to shorter summer hours. Our worship services are led by a team of enthusiastic lay leaders who enjoy the opportunity to relax a bit and try some new things with a smaller gathering in the sanctuary.

Summer is my time to renew and recharge my batteries after a year that has been both inspiring and challenging. In late June I head to Minneapolis for the Unitarian Universalist Association's General Assembly. It feels great to have made it to this stage in my ministry. It's a bit like receiving tenure and I have all of you to thank for helping me to grow as a minister. Change never comes easily, and relationships always take a lot of work on both sides of the equation. But that's what constitutes true love. After four years, I am as grateful and as happy that I am here as I was during my first year. My care and respect for this community deepens with each day.

Annual General Meeting Update

On Monday, June 7, a lively and upbeat Annual General Meeting saw the adoption of a trial year for the adapted governance structure, the election of an enthusiastic group of lay leaders and the approval of Shoshanna Green to become a Lay Chaplain.

Governance Task Force Update

At the meeting, the Governance Task Force gave a short presentation about the proposed new governance structure. The main elements of this adapted structure are:

- 1) Town Hall meetings that engage the congregation
- 2) A Council focusing on the daily life of the Church
- 3) A Steering Committee which looks primarily at longer term issues and policy development.

A motion was presented asking for a one year trial of the adapted structure. A strong majority voted in favor of the motion. In addition, Denis Barsalo has volunteered and been chosen to be the moderator for Council meetings and liaison to the Steering Committee.

The Governance Task Force (Petrina Lee Poy, Andrew Blakeslee, Alison Hall, Diane Rollert) will now take an advisory role, helping the new leadership adjust to the structure, as needed. The Church as Art Gallery?

Plans are afoot to create an art gallery at UCM. The art gallery project arose as the service project of Patricia Gordon's covenant group. This group and I have done the initial spadework — evaluating and selecting an appropriate space, consulting with other congregations, and submitting a proposal to the UCM executive and board.

Now, the Art Steering Committee needs to discover whether there are enough artists and art lovers in the congregation to warrant launching the gallery. In addition to art lovers, budding artists and artists with bodies of work ready to show, we need to identify persons who are qualified to evaluate art, and "jury" the selection of artists and work to showcase. We envision a rotating jury of three.

Spirit Play class in Children's Chapel



Spirit Play winds down, but not for long!

Our two Spirit Play classes had their final lessons based on the story behind our Flower Communion. Rita Izzi, one teller for that day, commented: "I really loved being a storyteller this year, particularly given how the children listened intently and quietly. I was surprised by how well they all did their "work" in an orderly and mindful manner on the last Sunday.

They were focused and respectful and seemed to enjoy themselves gently. What a great program! Of course, it really helps that we have such great children in RE!"

Those great children have taken part in nine different lessons about aspects of Unitarian Universalism, such as our water ceremony or the explanation of our Flaming Chalice; they've heard seven different promise stories (corresponding to our principles), and had an additional ten stories drawn from our six different sources, with more to come next year.

Volunteer storytellers and doorkeepers, often doubling as story box builders, comprised a pool of almost 20 people who worked hard to present these lessons and stories, as well as to set up the classrooms and art materials used by the children in response each week. We drank water all year, to save our new mats from sticky juice, and feasted on fresh fruits brought in by many kind donors.

When many of those involved in the program met with Caroline in late March, it was resolved to continue this curriculum/quiet process in both the Garden and Primers' rooms next year. We even have two more people interested in training as leaders of Spirit Play classes!

Unsung Hero Award 2010 goes to Frank (Paco) Greene

Excerpt from the speech given by Jack Cobb, Sunday, June 20, 2010

Today, it is my privilege and honour, to announce the 2010 recipient of the Unsung Hero Award. First introduced by the Board of Management in 1996, this award was created to honour a member of the congregation who not only contributed to the health and vitality of the church, but also to the life of the wider community. It is awarded to someone who works steadfastly – usually in the background, and adds a special dimension to our congregation.

The names of all the recipients are inscribed on a special plaque which hangs in the Thomas Room upstairs, and today we proudly add: 2010: Frank Greene.

Those of you who know Frank will not be surprised at this news. For those who don't know him at all, or just a little, let me give you a brief, very brief, history:

Both Frank and his wife, Carol, started their lives as Americans. Today they are the holders of dual citizenship, and as far as this church is concerned, their lives began in 1970 when the Greene family moved to Montreal. Prior to that, they had lived in New Jersey, where Frank taught in the Graduate School of Education at Rutgers University. Next stop was New York State, where he was Director of the Reading Clinic at Syracuse University. Frank started attending Unitarian services in New Jersey in 1964, so he's been involved with Unitarianism for 46 years!

In 1967, the family traveled to Montreal for EXPO 67, little thinking that one day they'd be back again, and for good. That "one day" came in 1970 when Frank accepted an invitation to become head of the Reading Center at McGill University, and to develop a Graduate program in Reading Education there.

In 1989 he retired and started an editing and desk-top-publishing business. He did that, as Carol says, "to keep him off the streets." No slouch herself, Carol taught at John Abbott College for 20 years. Education doesn't run in this family — it sprints.

Frank has been an active member here for many, many years, and when I say "active" you can't place enough emphasis on that word. Today, we are honouring a man who focuses his energies on reading, bread-baking, acting as the unofficial church photographer, playing with the computer and its many possibilities, giving large helpings of love to his grandchildren, and giving and giving and giving his talents and enthusiasm to filling many of the tasks that make this place tick.

To my mind, Frank is a Renaissance Man – someone who excels in a wide variety of subjects or fields. To cover them properly would take all day, so here are some highlights.

Charles Eddis, our minister emeritus, tells me that Frank first came to Charles's attention in the early eighties when Frank was pressing the church to become computer literate. He succeeded in that mission, and his work here resulted in many of the computerized systems that serve us well to this day.

Frank was also an active member of a succession of committees overseeing the internship of candidates for the ministry — serving the Lakeshore congregation, as well as this church. He joined the board here, and was President in the early 1990's. In 1994 the Project Management Committee put together a plan to build a new church to replace the old one which had burned to the ground.. When he retired as President, he stayed on the committee and helped see the project through to completion. Look around you now and you will see the results of their labors.

Frank's stature in this church is well summed-up by Charles who says, "When I came to Montreal, I got the impression that this fellow, Frank Greene, who was out of town at the time, was some kind of deity.

We all know of St. Francis of Assisi. And now we know of St. Frank of Montreal. Members here have contributed comments on his personality and attributes. Among them: "With Frank,

what you see is what you get. He is a kind, generous, caring, "Let's-get-it-done," kind of guy. He does not suffer fools gladly, and, while Frank is his name, it's also an adjective which well describes the kind of man he is. Our community is blessed to have him as a member."

Sandra Hunt, that tower of power in the musical life here, thinks of Frank as a generous emotional and intellectual supporter who encouraged her to start up a chamber music series, to introduce the Laliberte-Steinway piano to Montrealers, and this sanctuary as a concert venue. In those days, he also designed and printed many of the posters and programs for our concerts.

Inspired by the potential community outreach of the new kitchen, Frank founded our community kitchens project (he makes great bread and cinnamon buns.) He brought the idea of Bid Nite to Montreal in 1986, and was heavily involved with it for over twenty years—helping to make it one of the most popular events in the church calendar.

Frank took an active role in completing our history project — a book titled "The Montreal Unitarians," which was published in 2001. He knows every crook and nanny in this place (sorry: "nook and cranny,")

He was a much-admired teacher/professor at McGill, always generous with his time and talents. Students saw him as a big bear of a man, but quickly realised he was unfailingly gentle in his dealings with others. A gentle man, and always a gentleman.

The work he has done for others in his time as a member here, will live on in those who have been touched by him and his examples. He's a man who gets things done and gives of himself unstintingly. If you look in the dictionary under the word, "persistent", you'll find Frank's picture

If you don't know him yet, I urge you to seek him out, and learn from him. You'll be glad you did. I know I am.
